OUR ROAD AHEAD

Was the Alumni Association Board troubled by what we learned? Absolutely. The fact is that the world, and the collegiate experience at NU, is different than when any of us were undergraduates. We need to understand, accept, and embrace the challenges presented. If we are truly meeting our mission, "Preparing men for life by coming together as scholars, living as brothers, and becoming leaders of tomorrow," undergraduates and alumni need to not only change but also be the change.

How do we adapt and get in front of the change? We thought it best to ask members about their experiences and what is creating the problems and/or holding them back. It became apparent that accountability (or lack thereof) was a key factor. Thomas Pain maybe said it best: "A body of men holding themselves

accountable to nobody ought not to be trusted by anybody." How does the fraternity begin to make that change?

SHAPING EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP

The first step was an executive leadership workshop on January 25, developed and run by Culture Partners of Temecula, California. It was a full day of training, interaction, and practice of how these 13 men can build a foundation of accountability, along with steps to take individually and with the members.

I was fortunate to witness this workshop, which I believe will pay huge dividends over the next year and beyond. We must thank **Rick Gestring '83, Γ450** for organizing this workshop and the Gamma Foundation for funding it. The Alumni Association Board had long discussed the need for executive officer training—this was a wonderful start.

COMMUNICATING WITH ALUMNI

The next step was the undergraduate executive team and Alumni Association Board retreat held one week later. The day began with an executive presentation summarizing their experience the week prior, while also illustrating their plan for the next twelve months.

Gamma Foundation Supports AF Σ Undergraduates

The Gamma Foundation's primary purpose is to fund scholarships and the *Aspire* Leadership Program, with funding coming from generous alumni. This past year, the Foundation Board initiated a Give to Gamma Day campaign. It started after the Big Red Tailgate reunion, and a Zoom call was held to share campaign success and highlight the on-campus chapter's accomplishments on November 7.

The call's date is important because it coincides with the date when Gamma Chapter was colonized at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln 71 years ago. A total of 44 alumni supported the campaign through online donations and checks, contributing more than \$51,000! This will be an annual campaign, so we look forward to our second annual day of giving this fall!

SCHOLARSHIP DISTRIBUTION

Scholarships are important for recruiting high-achieving new members. Once they are house members, scholarships help finance their education and recognize academic achievement. A total of 23 men made the dean's list last fall, and another six made the dean's commendation list. A GPA of 3.5 or better is required for the dean's list, and 3.7 or higher for the commendation list.

Almost a third of our men made these two lists! Scholarships are awarded for grades but are also given to men in leadership positions within the fraternity and in campus organizations.

BUILDING YOUNG LEADERS

The Aspire Leadership Experience is unique to Gamma Chapter and continues to evolve and gain appreciation. Members of the Alumni Board of Trustees and the house executive board conduct Aspire to ACTIVATE sessions for new members, and Aspire to ASSOCIATE sessions (alumni and undergraduate member leadership development program.)

A new SIGMA SIX executive leadership program was launched this year. This program (Continued on page 2)



Alpha Gamma Sigma National Executive Council Board

There are six Alpha Gamma Sigma Chapters in the United States (The Ohio State University, the University of Missouri, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, Western Illinois University, and Tennessee Tech University).

All six chapters are members of the National Executive Council. The role and purpose of the NEC Board includes:

- 1. Establishment of policies and guidelines for how AGS operates on a national level.
- 2. Provision of guidance when necessary to maintain the integrity of the AGS brand.
- 3. Providing leadership development by conducting training programs for chapter executive boards.

- 4. Offering a medium for chapters to share information and ideas.
- 5. Evaluation of expansion and growth opportunities to other universities.
- 6. Resolution of other issues that require broader consideration beyond the local chapter.

The NEC Board includes at least one alumnus and the president from each chapter. Gamma Chapter currently has three alumni serving on the NEC Board: Eli Thomssen '56, **Г77**, **Monty Larsen '85, Г496**, and **Mark Frank** '90, **Г581**. The chapter president currently serving on the Board is **Gavin Dozler '22**, **Г1166**. The Board meets monthly and schedules a conclave once per year. The next conclave is April 11-12, hosted by IlliDell Chapter at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. The first day is an evening event and provides an opportunity to establish relationships and build comradery. The agenda for April 12 will be sessions discussing subjects of mutual interest including new member recruitment, member development, chapter philanthropy projects, maintaining and/or improving house GPA, alumni chapter involvement and engagement, expansion opportunities, etc. Conclave will conclude with the election of officers and a dinner.
